Gathering with friends and family during the holidays is a tradition most of us take for granted. But for so many of the children served by CASA, the holidays provide a painful reminder that they are different from their peers – separated from parents, siblings, pets and close friends as they reside in foster care and other safe placements to shield them from further abuse and/or neglect. Tears are shed for past traumas, a lost sense of security and stability, the pain of separation, and the uncertainty of the future. ***It's not a question of where they will go for Thanksgiving, Christmas or Hanukkah, it's a question of where they will live during their remaining days of childhood and who will be there to comfort them through the traumas and joys of everyday life.***

As these children and youth wait for a safe, permanent home via adoption or a return to parents who are struggling to remain sober, employed, and drug-free, the holidays can be a lonely time. Fortunately, this is often a time when many caring members of our community step forward to offer their help. It is this outpouring of concern and generosity that makes me particularly thankful during this holiday season. Just when our staff and volunteers are overwhelmed by the tragic reality of new abuse and neglect cases in Douglas County, and the increased needs for clothing assistance and other support for our CASA kids, the phone rings or my email in-box reveals a caring individual or group ready to extend a helping hand. This meaningful support is what makes our community special. Your financial donations to CASA, your in-kind contributions, your volunteer hours, and your creative and meaningful offers to share your time and resources truly make a difference.



As the director of a United Way agency, I see evidence on a daily basis that we are living united. FOSTER CARE ADOPTION: FACTS & FIGURES

Every year, more than 114,000 children in foster care are available for adoption. Many spend more than five years waiting for permanent, loving homes.

Who are these waiting children?

*There are an estimated 463,000 children in foster care in the United States, and more than 114,000 of them are waiting to be adopted.

*Through no fault of their own, these children enter foster care as a result of abuse, neglect and/or abandonment.

*The average child waits for an adoptive family for more than two years.

*19 percent spend 5 years or more waiting for a family.

*The average age of a child waiting for an adoptive family is 8.

What happens to them?

*55,000 are adopted from foster care.

*More than 29,000 children reach the age of 18 without ever finding a forever family.

A library is only as good as its patrons. That is true at CASA. We invite board members, staff, and volunteers to use our newly organized resource library in the Jean Shepherd Room. The books are now arranged in Dewey Decimal Classification order and have check out cards and date due slips. The check out period for books is one month; for DVDs, one week. Please sign the card, affix the date due on the slip in the back of the book and place the card in the charging tray. (Soon to be brightly decorated!) A CASA staff

member will also be happy to assist you.


Here are the categories for the Dewey Decimal System (DDC).

000 – Computer science, information and general works

100 – Philosophy and psychology

200 – Religion

- 300 – Social sciences
- 400 – Language
- 500 – Science
- 600 – Technology
- 700 – Arts and recreation
- 800 – Literature
- 900 – History, geography and biography



Our resource library has fiction, as well as nonfiction, for adults. We also have children’s literature in our collection. For basic readers without chapter headings, the call number is E and for books with chapters, the call number is F. For all books in the collection, the first three letters of the author’s last name are under the classification number or letter.

When you return a book or DVD, please give it to one of the staff members, and they will place it back on the shelf. Please do not do this task yourself. We want to keep the books handy by having them shelved correctly.

If you would like to help with our library project, we will gladly accept donations. Since there is a trained librarian on board with this project, cash donations would be best. That way, we can build our collection incrementally. For instance, most of our books now are in the Social Science (300) category, **especially 362.7, child abuse**. The librarian can keep abreast of new titles in appropriate subject areas and build the collection. Eventually, we shall compile a spreadsheet of the categories and titles in our collection and link it to our website so that you can check online for the resources you need. Since our collection is small, we ask that you return materials promptly. If you have any CASA items at home that are not cataloged, please bring them to the office so that we can add them to our collection. We hope that these changes will be beneficial to you. We want these materials to circulate widely, and we welcome any suggestions for improvement. Thank you for your help with keeping our library running smoothly.

Editors Note: We extend our heartfelt appreciation to CASA volunteer Susie Nightingale for her countless hours of work on our resource library. We are fortunate to benefit from her expertise as a retired librarian (now semi-retired!), but we need your help to keep this library functional. PLEASE RETURN ANY BOOKS OR DVDs YOU HAVE AT HOME THAT BELONG TO CASA – otherwise, you may get a phone call or invoice soon regarding your “past due” items. Thank you!
